NEWSLETTER FROM LES AND DEBBIE DORNAN IN NEPAL

We recently heard from our missionary friends in Nepal, Les and Debbie Dornan. Pontiac First UMC is in a covenant relationship with the Dornans, who serve as medical missionaries at Tansen Hospital. They send their heartfelt thanks for all who have prayed for them, and have provided encouraging cards and emails, and financial support!!

As in the U.S, extreme weather events have been at the forefront in Nepal in recent days also. The monsoon, or wet season, began in Nepal in June, a little earlier than usual. Tansen hospital relies on the monsoon season to refill their water storage tanks which were recently erected. Unfortunately, the 2017 monsoon season turned out to be one of the heaviest monsoons in recent history. Extensive flooding was experienced in many low lying areas across Nepal, India and Bangaladesh. 65,000 homes were destroyed as well as 383 schools during this year's flooding. 461,000 people have been displaced.

Tansen hospital continues to work at record levels. The hospital has 169 beds available. The hospital has been seeing 10,000 patients per month—more than ever before!

The Dornans ask for prayers for the pastoral staff of the hospital. Teen suicides are becoming an increasingly worrisome problem in Nepal, as it is here at home. The staff will be going out into the communities and schools to try to educate youth to seek help when they are feeling overwhelmed and unable to handle their problems.

On a personal note, the Dornans report that their lives have been filled with both joy and sadness. They were recently visited by Les's older sister and husband for a few days. They had great fun in showing them their workplace and touring the local area. Also in July and August, the Dornans were able to have a full family reunion in the U.S. for the first time in over 2 years. They especially enjoyed the time they had with their beautiful and bright granddaughter.

On a much sadder note, Les's younger sister Becky passed away suddenly on Sept. 9. Les and Debbie had just visited with her and Les's mother in August of this year. Les was able to return to the U.S. for her memorial service.

Pastor's Perspective:

"You wanna be where everybody knows your name", theme song to "Cheer".

"Do not neglect to meet with fellow believers." Hebrews 10:25

One of the hallmarks of the Wesleyan/Methodist movement was the innovative use of small groups/classes for discipleship. One hundred years ago most adult members of this church were also members of a class, typically a Sunday School class. In fact, for many years attendance in adult Sunday School equaled or exceeded that in worship. The leaders of these classes received prominent mention in bulletins and directories and the classes typically took annual pictures to celebrate their membership.



The "Trumbo" Sunday School Class, all ladies, taken on the steps of the Pontiac Reformatory (now the State Prison) Some familiar last names include Opperman, Husted, Shepherd, Young, Turner, Myers, Knapp, Morris, Johnson and Legg.

The Sunday School classes met weekly, typically studying a topic often supplied by the pastor. In a 1913 church bulletin the pastor, Rev. John Ryan, wrote;

"We urge the Sunday School as one of the helpful agencies for new members. Be identified with one of the classes at once, and we would urge if any of the classes are not organized....that said class recognize the advantage of such a plan and fall in with modern and efficient methods. We will publish in the next issue the names of the classes in which every member is a member of the church." (Cont'd on page 5)

Topics which Rev. Ryan encouraged the classes to study included "the church and its mission", "in the world but not of it", pleasures and past times", "the power of habit" and "endless life". Each class focused on Bible study and its application. Classes often took offerings which were designated for mission work

Classes each had a secretary and often a team of elders who would check on any errant members. Attendance was dutifully checked, and reported to the pastor as well. By the 1960's Sunday School attendance, especially among adults, had waned and many of the classes discontinued. Attendance at worship became the church focus, and discipleship was almost exclusively learned in this hour.

In the last few years, however, the importance of the Sunday School and small group has been recognized again. Many churches encourage or require members to be part of a small group or Sunday School class. The sense of belonging, of having a place where you can ask questions, of knowing that you will be missed if absent, is integral to the Christian faith. If you want to find that place of belonging please ask your pastor or Ellen Yedinak, director of Adult Discipleship for help finding that place.
