

PASTOR'S CORNER:

¹³ "Yet if you devote your heart to him and stretch out your hands to him, ¹⁴if you put away the sin that is in your hand and allow no evil to dwell in your tent, ¹⁵then, free of fault, you will lift up your face; you will stand firm and without fear. Job 11:13-15

In 1833 railroads had not yet reached Illinois, our state capitol was still in Vandalia, and the population of the state had just reached 150,000 (roughly the size of Springfield today). Our area of the state had just emerged from the deadly Black Hawk wars and many native Americans had been forced from the area, many to Oklahoma.

In 1824 the Illinois Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized and staffed largely by Kentucky preachers. These preachers were assigned a circuit of communities (hence the name "circuit rider") to preach out, visiting via horseback each community ten-twelve times per year. They would preach, serve communion, baptize and help resolve any issues in the local, lay led congregations. William Royal was assigned as pastor to the circuit that operated out of Fort Peoria and included Tazewell, Woodford and Livingston Counties. Royal was originally from West Virginia and was reputed to be a fiery preacher and devout Sabbatarian (he would do no work on Sundays). He later served as a circuit rider in LaSalle and Bureau counties. Shortly before the Civil War he traveled with caravan west to Oregon (still refusing to ride on Sundays) where he died in 1870.



There are so many options and too many distractions that can easily lead us from what is best to what is less than best. In Children's Ministry at Pontiac FUMC, we focus on what we can do to share Jesus' love effectively with as many children as possible through Vision, Partnership and the Power of the Holy Spirit.



The **VISION** provides Bible-Based children's programming, year-round and seasonally, in large and small-group settings, in same-age and mixed groups. We minister to over 100 children per year between PK and 5th Grade, utilizing the talents and dedication of over 60 volunteer teachers and youth helpers.

Sunday School Hour

We "Dig In" to an experiential curriculum with age-based classrooms on Sunday mornings for our Sunday School Hour from ME HEART OF GOT 9:30-10:30 am.

PARTNERSHIP wears many hats. Because ministry to children is not the wind-up variety, it takes cooperation and a willingness to remain flexible. We move forward, addressing the challenges of a changing culture, offering the unchanging and faithful message of Jesus' saving grace and all-encompassing love. Those who choose to serve alongside Children's Ministry provide fresh energy coupled with lasting commitment.

Volunteers procure supplies, prepare lessons, lead singing, fix meals, and lovingly nurture, guide and encourage the children we serve. **Donors** bring in items needed for special events and projects.

Prayer Warriors lift up our leaders and families with fervent, faith-filled prayers.

As the Vision provides the track to follow, the Volunteers are like freely moving wheels, willing to "roll" in whatever direction our commitment to the Great Commission leads.

Children's Moment & Worship Bags

At 8:30 and 10:30 Sunday Morning Worship, families are encouraged to pick up a Worship Bag packed with seasonal quiet activities for each child in attendance.

Early in each service the children are invited to the front of the sanctuary for the Children's Moment, a time of sharing with Pastor Tom or one of our Children's Ministry volunteers.

Sunday Morning Children's Church

Nestled in the last half of Sunday morning 10:30 Worship, Children's Church offers a 30-minute children's Christian media experience and a brief time of discussion, purposefully selected to enrich the lesson from Sunday School.

AWANA Clubs & Children's Choir

Wednesday evenings during the school year ramp up with our AWANA Clubs as we extend our efforts in outreach to children of the community. Thanks to our crew of wonderful cooks, we are able to provide a dinner at 4:40, then we spend the next hour and a half teaching Bible stories, leading activities, facilitating handbook time with Bible verse memorization, engaging teams in games, and sharing the gift of music in song. The Children's Choir

sings each month, alternating between 8: 30 and 10: 30 morning worship services.



On our own we would surely derail, but with the **POWER** of the Holy Spirit, we can face the challenges of the twists and turns that our culture presents. We look to Jesus for wisdom and the words to speak to a people broken and disjointed who think God is angry or unreachable.

After-School Tutoring

Tuesdays and Thursdays at Meadowview Court, our team of **Tutoring** volunteers meet with children from the community, Kindergarten through 8th Grade, to assist and encourage them with homework and life skills. From 3:30-5:30, children receive a snack and participate in Bible lessons, educational goals, play time, crafts and activities.



Through Vision, Partnerships with staff and volunteers, and the Power and guidance of the Holy Spirit, the journey of serving in Children's Ministry is endowed, mobilized, and energized by the driving force of Jesus' command to love 'the least of these.'

Vacation Bible School is on the way:



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PARISH NURSE NOTES:

The news has been full of reports on the Coronavirus. What is coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)? Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China.

Can people in the U.S. get COVID-19? Yes. COVID-19 is spreading from person to person in parts of the United States. Risk of infection with COVID-19 is higher for people who are close contacts of someone known to have COVID-19, for example healthcare workers, or household members. Other people at higher risk for infection are those who live in or have recently been in an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19.

Have there been cases of COVID-19 in the U.S.? Yes. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 21, 2020. How does COVID-19 spread? The virus that causes COVID-19 probably emerged from an animal source, but is now spreading from person to person. The virus is thought to spread mainly between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It also may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads.

What are the symptoms of COVID-19? Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of • fever • cough • shortness of breath What are severe complications from this virus? Some patients have pneumonia in both lungs, multi-organ failure and in some cases death.

How can I help protect myself? People can help protect themselves from respiratory illness with everyday preventive actions. • Avoid close contact with people who are sick. • Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands. • Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available. If you are sick, to keep from spreading respiratory illness to others, you should • Stay home when you are sick. • Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash. • Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

What should I do if I recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19? If you have traveled from an affected area, there may be restrictions on your movements for up to 2 weeks. If you develop symptoms during that period (fever, cough, trouble breathing), seek medical advice. Call the office of your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel and your symptoms. They will give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness. While sick, avoid contact with people, don't go out and delay any travel to reduce the possibility of spreading illness to others. Is there a vaccine? There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to take everyday preventive actions, like avoiding close contact with people who are sick and washing your hands often. Is there a treatment? There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19.

We need to be praying for anyone affected with the disease.
